## Rector's Writ

When we think about what the Church is called to be and do in today's world, we sometimes end up with more questions than answers. Most of us know and remember the definition in our Catechism reminding us how we are ALL ministers of the Church; "...lay persons, bishops, priests, and deacons." In the Catechism (and in our experience), we find soon enough that the Church is described as holy in the creeds, NOT necessarily because it's earned that reputation. "The Church is holy, because the Holy Spirit dwells in it, consecrates its members, and guides them to do God's work." That work includes gathering for worship and prayer, teaching and proclaiming the Gospel, and promoting justice, peace, and love. The work and ministry we're called to do are not limited only to what goes on in the Church. Our worship concludes with one of four dismissals. Once we've given the triune God our worship, prayers and praise, we are then sent out into the world to proclaim God's grace and goodness; to share the Good News. These dismissals are a sending forth; a general focus for what our life is ideally supposed to be focused on in the week ahead. We are to "...go forth in the name of Christ; "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord;" "...go forth into the world rejoicing in the power of the Spirit;" or the simple one which should be a daily focus in all our lives, "Let us bless the Lord." (BCP p. 366) To which ever one of these is used, the people gathered for worship respond with "Thanks be to God." We know we'll need the Lord's help in doing such work, and we trust God always to provide that help.

Bishop Thomas Ken (1637-1711) wrote a lovely prayer that was posted at the door of a Christian hospital. It's a prayer that could be posted at the door of our church, and the door of our homes as well, so that—entering and leaving—we might be reminded to be welcoming and faithful followers of our loving God and Savior.

*"O God, make the door of this house wide enough to receive all who need human love and fellowship, and a heavenly Father's care; and narrow enough to shut out all envy, pride and hate. Make it a threshold smooth enough to be no stumbling-block to children, nor to straying feet, but rugged enough to turn back the tempter's power; make it a gateway to thine eternal kingdom. Amen."*

### **STRESS MANAGEMENT**

A young lady confidently walked around the room while leading and explaining stress management to an audience with a raised glass of water. Everyone knew she was going to ask the ultimate question, "half empty or half full?" She fooled them all. "How heavy is this glass of water?" She inquired with a smile. Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. to 20 oz.

She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance.

In each case it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes." She continued, "And that's the way it is with stress. If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burdens become increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry one. As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we're refreshed, we can carry on with the burden. So, as early in the evening you can, put all your burdens down. Don't carry them through the evening and into the night. Pick them up tomorrow."

# *Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends*

*They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still.  
The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.*

Wilson Carlile

September 26

Wilson Carlile was born in 1847 in Brixton, England. He was the oldest of twelve children born into a middle-class family. Musically gifted, he was drawn to the piano where he began to experiment with chords at the age of 3. His mother recognized his talent and began to teach him to read music. As is often the case with the musically gifted, he was also quite good at languages, speaking French, German, and Italian fluently as an adult.

Wilson suffered from some kind of spinal weakness his whole life and this appeared to have hampered his formal education. He apparently studied in France for a while and, when he returned to England, he joined his grandfather's business firm. Owing to the elder Carlile's failing health, by the early 1870s young Wilson was a successful businessman. Ambitious for wealth, he was determined to earn his first 20,000 pounds (a princely sum in those days!) before he turned 25. He succeeded. However, in 1873 a serious depression began and continued with few breaks for over 20 years.

Young Wilson was ruined financially. He suffered both a mental and physical breakdown and was confined to bed. When he recovered, his father took him into his own firm. However, Wilson had lost interest in the business world, preferring instead to engage in religious work. He joined the Plymouth Brethren and worked among the gang members who inhabited Blackfriars where the Brethren met. Soon he joined the Church of England and was confirmed. About this time, the great evangelist Dwight L. Moody held a series of rallies in the area. Wilson volunteered to help in any way he could. Ira Sankey, the musical director, recognized Wilson's musical abilities and had him accompany the singing of the huge crowds. It was in this way that Wilson developed a solid understanding and appreciation of the techniques of evangelism and the role that music can play.

Wilson decided to become an evangelistic priest within the Anglican Church. He was accepted by the London School of Divinity and after 18 months passed the examinations. He was ordained deacon in St. Paul's Cathedral in 1880 and began a curacy at St. Mary Abbots, Kensington. He attempted to evangelize the guards and workers at Kensington Palace with only limited success. He began to hold open-air meetings and to preach on street corners. Complaints followed and he was told he would have to quit. He resigned his curacy and devoted himself to slum missions.

He decided to use the working person to help fellow workers but to do so within the structure of the Church of England. This sort of mission work was already underway in a few other areas of England; however, Wilson wanted to coordinate all the efforts so that trained evangelists could be sent to any parish where they were needed. In 1882, the Church Army was formed. He purposefully chose the word "Army" because he intended to make war against sin and the devil. Wilson served as head of Church Army until a few weeks before his death. He was authoritative but always recognized the higher authority of the Church of England, never going into a parish without the approval of the local priest and never into a prison or public institution without the invitation of the chaplain. By 1925, the Church Army had grown to become the largest home mission society in the Church of England. He continued to serve as its leader until weeks before his death on September 26, 1942.

**Prayer:** God of boundless energy and light: We thank you for the courage and passion of Wilson Carlile who, after the example of your Son, sought new ways to open your Church to diverse leaders as beacons of the Gospel of Christ. Quicken our hearts to give bold witness to Jesus Christ; who with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

# PIPINGS

I often hear the question, "Why don't we sing my favorite hymn in church?" Do you have a favorite hymn from one of our Grace Church hymnals that is not sung often enough, or perhaps not in recent memory?


The hymns used in our Sunday morning worship services are generally chosen for their relevance to the lessons and/or theme for the day. When this isn't possible, or when another more general hymn seems equally appropriate to the day or season, I will often choose that hymn, or even simply another hymn that I think we might like to sing. This, then, brings us back to our favorite hymns.

This summer we have had a few people choose their favorite hymn and, during the announcement break in our service, tell us briefly why it is a favorite or has special meaning for them. Do you have a hymn and story you'd like to share? Now's your chance! The only requirements are 1) that you be willing to tell us about it during the announcements the day it is sung; and 2) that the hymn you select be in one of our two hymnals (*The Hymnal 1982* or *Common Praise*) that are in the pew racks (this due to copyright concerns).

I will normally aim to include a "favorite hymn" as one of the morning's hymns on the third Sunday of the month and will contact you to coordinate the hymn's scheduling. I schedule several weeks of hymns in advance, so you will have plenty of notice J.
