Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends

They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still. The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.

Wulfstan (c. 1008-January 18, 1095)

Wulfstan was born in Warwickshire, England, on the eve of the Danish Conquest (c.1008 or a little later), into a well-connected family. His mother may have been the sister of Wulfstan, Archbishop of York. The younger Wulfstan was probably named for his famous uncle, but it may be that Wulfstan's parents named him from a combination of their own names: his father was called Æthelstan ('noble stone') and his mother was called Wulfgifu ('wolf gift'), so they named their son 'Wulfstan', joining elements from the two names. The young man was educated at monastic schools and was ordained between 1033 and 1038. He became a monk at Worcester, where he later became prior. On Sept. 8, 1062, he was consecrated Bishop of Worcester and served there until his death.

Wulfstan lived during an extraordinary time in English history. In 1066, the Duke of Normandy led an army into England and seized the throne by force, becoming known in history as William the Conqueror. William the Conqueror changed England in many ways, including the practice of slavery. He restricted the slave trade by banning the sale of slaves outside of England and discontinuing the English practice of taking slaves following victories in war. However, there is more to this story and is probably the reason Wulfstan is listed as a saint.

The English had long practiced slavery, especially taking prisoners/slaves from groups they conquered. The inhabitants of Bristol engaged in a lucrative slave trade with Ireland. Through Wulfstan's preaching over the course of many trips to Bristol, he convinced the slave traders to stop. Indeed, the inhabitants of Bristol had become so convinced by Wulfstan's teachings against slavery that they even violently attacked someone who continued to engage in the practice. Notably, Wulfstan ended the slave trade in Bristol before William the Conqueror officially issued a law prohibiting the sale of slaves outside of England, although King William gets the credit. By the year 1200, slavery was virtually non-existent in England and would not be practiced by the English again until the early modern period.

As a supporter of William the Conqueror and his successor William II, Wulfstan helped the church in England in its transition from Anglo-Saxon Christianity to Anglo-Norman Christianity. He was canonized in 1203 and is commemorated in the Episcopal calendar of the church year on Jan. 19.
