Rector's Writ

With the demands of our work world and events to plug into almost every weekend, it's easy to forget the importance of play. We all need quiet time and rest; time to offer our prayerful worship and to seek renewal and peace; time to listen and simply be with God. We might think about that in terms of walking in the woods, by the ocean or a lake, being with family, or being in church. We can sense the Spirit's presence in a variety of ways and places. Our spiritual life longs for a nearness and connection with God. Prayer and contemplation are important but they're not the ONLY way to know and listen to the Lord. With summer coming on we might do well to consider "play" as a time for listening, being creative, and being close to God, too.

Now, those with a strong Protestant work ethic might think this notion of play is ridiculous... fine for children and teens with energy to burn. But how do adults "play?!"

"Play" can be loosely defined as an enjoyable activity that so captivates us, we lose track of time. Frederick Buechner writes, when we're lost in play we don't necessarily "accomplish anything...we're not providing anything. There's nothing edifying or educational or particularly helpful" in playing. It's just PLAY and that's all; no agenda, no goals to achieve, no responsibilities to worry about. Play has as much variety as personalities. For some it's just holding a baby or being around grandchildren (who joyfully pull us into their play!). For others it may include crossword puzzles, cooking, trains, cars, dolls, fishing, or digging around in dirt and grass (the adult term is gardening). Whatever the method, it helps to remember play is one way to be close to God...a way to respond to God's playful side and join in as the Spirit moves you.

King David, in response to all the Lord had done for him DANCED before the Ark of the Covenant. In explaining his dancing to those who didn't understand, he remembered the good God had done for him and said, "Therefore I will play before the Lord." Psalm 104 gives us the idea that even God has a bit of playfulness in his creation. God is praised for creating the "great and wide sea..." for the Leviathan "which you have made for the sport of it." (BCP, p. 737)

Here's hoping your summer will be a pleasant time with family and friends; that you'll travel safely; that we'll see you at church; that you'll find time for rest and quiet...and PLAY.

Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends

They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still. The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.

Chief Seattle (c1790--June 7, 1866)

June 7

A leading figure among his people in the Pacific Northwest, Chief Seattle pursued a path of accommodation to white settlers, attempting to preserve peace between his people and the settlers. Noah (the name given him at his baptism in 1848) Seattle was born about 1790 near Puget Sound, in the northwest corner of the contiguous United States. Tribal leadership was not always patriarchal; he received his chiefdom designation from his maternal uncle. He was chief of his tribe and of the large alliance of tribes in his area. Seattle earned his reputation at a young age as a leader and a warrior, ambushing and defeating groups of tribal enemy raiders. He was tall and broad, standing nearly six feet tall. Traders from the Hudson Bay Company gave him the nickname *Le Gros* (The Big Guy). It was reported that his voice could be heard for at least three-quarters of a mile.

As more white settlers moved onto the ancestral lands, he chose peace rather than war, and offered the settlers friendship and assistance. When his people were driven from their traditional clamming grounds, Seattle met David Swinson ("Doc") Maynard in Olympia; they formed a friendly relationship useful to both. Maynard was a pioneer, a doctor, and a civic leader who was sympathetic to the rights of Native Americans. Persuading the settlers at the white settlement of Duwamps to rename their town *Seattle*, Maynard established their support for Chief Seattle's people and negotiated relatively peaceful relations with the tribes under Seattle's leadership.

Seattle became a Christian and instituted in his tribe a practice of communal prayers morning and evening, a practice continued after his death. In 1855 (being then about 65 years old), he signed a treaty that ceded most of his tribe's ancestral lands to the settlers and moved his people north. Seattle kept his people out of the Battle of Seattle in 1856. Afterwards, he was unwilling to lead his tribe to the reservation established, since the plan mixed two rival tribes and was likely to lead to bloodshed. Maynard persuaded the government of the necessity of allowing Seattle to move instead to his father's longhouse on Agate Passage, a place named "Old Man House." On that occasion, Chief Seattle gave an eloquent and poignant speech in his native tongue on justice, and on love of and respect for the land. Portions of the speech are often quoted by environmentalists, though the translations vary and some of them are quite inaccurate. He died June 7, 1866, on the reservation at Port Madison, Washington.

PRAYER: Almighty God, who in giving us dominion over things on earth have made us fellow workers in your creation: Grant us such wisdom and reverence toward You that, following the counsel and example of your servant Noah Seattle, we may so use the resources of nature that no one may suffer from our abuse of them, and that generations yet to come may continue to praise You for Your bounty; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with You and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.
