There was an article some time ago that mentioned how the average household receives over two hundred appeals per year for funds. Those appeals represent a wide variety of needs, many very worthwhile: children's hospitals, any number of diseases, wounded veterans, food for the poor to name only a few. They're all good causes, and it's likely that many of our members give to help provide what's needed.

Stewardship, however is more than giving to support a cause. It's giving for a reason—a spiritual reason and response. It's giving of our time, talents, and money in gratitude for all that God gives us. It's recognizing all we have comes from God: faith, family, health. Both women are of the age to be more vulnerable to COVID.



Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends

They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still. The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.

Southern author Eudora Welty wrote that Southerners not only listen <u>to</u> the story; we listen <u>for</u> the story, a skill born of playing quietly under the bushes that surrounded the porch, listening to the adult conversation in the cool of the evening (before air conditioning!), hoping the adults would forget we were there. I get a similar sense of listening <u>for</u> the story each November when I see our list of friends and family who have entered God's nearer presence. What are the stories of faith here? What are the lessons we have learned from these saints who lived among us? Below is a story of one of my saints.

William A. Dees, Jr.

June 10, 1920—January 9, 2006

I first met Bill Dees in the doorway of my classroom in Goldsboro, NC. It was early in the 1969-1970 school year; I was a very new teacher and was finally getting my class of freshman civics students to trust me and each other and to discuss the lessons. Goldsboro City Schools had integrated the faculty the year before and this year, students were mixed as well—all students grades 9-12 were at the formerly white high school and all students grades 6-8 were at the formerly Black high school building. It was a tense time, but my classes were making progress. Suddenly the discussion stopped cold and a student surreptitiously pointed to the door. There, in the open doorway, stood my principal and Mr. Dees, chairman of the school board. Mr. Dees grinned, greeted me warmly, told the students he really liked what he'd heard, then turned and left.

Bill graduated from Goldsboro High School in 1938 and from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1941 with a bachelor's degree in political science. He immediately joined the Navy and served as a member of the bomb disposal squad in the southwest Pacific. He came home after the war and graduated from Carolina again in 1948 with his law degree, returning to Goldsboro and joining his dad's law firm. At this point he stepped up and continued his family's tradition of public service. He served on the Goldsboro Board of Aldermen and was appointed to the N. C. Board of Higher Education. He was appointed to the Goldsboro City Board of Education and served as its chairman during the turbulent period of integration. After being elected to the Board of Trustees of the NC Consolidated University in 1969, he was elected to the first Board of Governors for the newly organized 16-campus University System and served as its first chairman. In 1990 he received the University Award, the highest honor awarded to a college or university trustee. He served on the Board of Governors of the NC Bar Association. In addition, he was active in his church where he served as an elder, superintendent of the Sunday School, and as an adult Sunday School teacher.

However commendable these accomplishments, I admire this man for his moral courage. The integration of the Goldsboro City Schools was accomplished under his leadership as Board chairman. The preparations were lengthy and involved much community engagement, often vocal and hostile. When the two-year plan was unveiled, many did not expect it to succeed. And yes, some teachers resigned. However, the difficult moves were accomplished without violence and without demonstrations, but with a focus on the well-being of all—students, school personnel, the community. When asked later why he took this very unpopular action, his response is telling: "It was the right thing to do."
