Rector's Writ

A few notes from the rector follow and a brief reminder to continue practicing measures to help keep our entire church family safe and healthy. It feels like we're all getting weary of the COVID-19 and Delta variant concerns and anxieties, but we still need to be vigilant in keeping the protection, safety, and health of all our parish family in mind.

PLEASE PRACTICE COVID-DELTA SAFETY MEASURES

At our August 17th meeting, the vestry \mathcal{E} rector re-visited the COVID-19 safety guidelines from earlier this summer. Portage county is in the red zone; as of Aug. 18th only two Ohio counties are NOT in the red zone. In light of the rising DELTA variant concerns, the vestry \mathcal{E} rector offer these updated guidelines:

- \circ Sunday School will NOT start on Sept. 12th § is suspended until further notice
- \diamond Children § Youth are asked to wear a mask while attending church § coffee hour
- All members are strongly encouraged to wear masks during worship (especially while singing) \mathcal{E} coffee hour (except while eating). When masks are removed please put them in your pocket or purse, NOT on the tables where we eat \mathcal{E} gather.
- Members are reminded to keep the required 6 feet social distance safety, especially: as we enter ξ leave church, as we go forward for Holy Communion, at coffee hour
- Please use hand sanitizer, especially prior to worship, communion, and coffee hour



The Special Giving on the Second Sunday of the Month

You know! All those baskets and the little white church on the communion rail... For those unfamiliar with these disciplines.

- 2 Cents a Meal (*metal bucket*)– The idea is to put two cents (or more) aside for each meal to be mindful of those who are hungry and turn it in here. It goes to The Center of Hope to assist with hunger programs in Portage County.
- Christian Cupboard (basket) Giving for the Portage County Christian Cupboard so food can be given to those in need.
- Habitat For Humanity–(basket) Pretty selfexplanatory... it's passed along to Portage County Habitat for Humanity.
- **Flowers** *(basket)* Giving for altar flowers when no member is covering the cost of flowers in memory of loved one or in celebration of a special event.
- **Birthdays** (wooden church) Giving in honor of birthdays or other special occasions. It goes into the Rector's Discretionary Fund. This can be used privately by Rev. Carol to assist parishioners and/or community members or cover miscellaneous small parish uses (gifts for grads, confirmands, etc)

In all cases you can give cash or checks. All donations are deposited to the Church's account to be passed along by the Treasurer to the various places, SO.... **If you write a check**, please make it out to Grace Episcopal and put the purpose *(from the list above)* in the memo line.

(Actually, the Flowers money goes directly to the Altar Guild's account, but making it out to the church works just fine for that too.)

Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends

They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still. The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.

Constance and Her Companions (1878)

September 9

In August 1878, yellow fever invaded the city of Memphis, Tennessee, for the third time in ten years. By the month's end, the disease had become epidemic and a quarantine was ordered. While more than 25,000 citizens had fled in terror, nearly 20,000 more remained to face the pestilence. As cases multiplied, the death toll averaged 200 people per day. When the worst was over, ninety percent of the people who remained had contracted the fever and more than 5,000 people had died. The city was so depopulated that it lost its charter and was not reorganized for fourteen years. The economic toll lasted for decades.

In that time of panic and flight, many brave men and women, both lay and ordained, remained at their posts of duty or came as volunteers to assist in spite of the terrible risk. Notable among these heroes were four Episcopal nuns from the Community of Saint Mary, and two of their clergy colleagues, all of whom died while tending to the sick. They have ever since been known as "The Martyrs of Memphis," as have those of other communions who ministered in Christ's name during this time of desolation.

The Sisters had come to Memphis in 1873, at Bishop Quintard's request, to found a school for girls adjacent to St. Mary's Cathedral. When the 1878 epidemic began, George C. Harris, the cathedral dean, and Sister Constance immediately organized relief work among the stricken. Helping were six of Constance's fellow Sisters of St. Mary; Sister Clare from St. Margaret's House, Boston, Massachusetts; the Reverend Charles C. Parsons, Rector of Grace and St. Lazarus Church, Memphis; and the Reverend Louis S. Schuyler, assistant at Holy Innocents, Hoboken, New Jersey. The cathedral group also included three physicians, two of whom were ordained Episcopal priests; the Sisters' two matrons; and several volunteer nurses from New York.

The cathedral buildings were located in the most infected region of Memphis. Here, amid sweltering heat and scenes of indescribable horror, these men and women of God gave relief to the sick, comfort to the dying, and homes to the many orphaned children. Only two of the workers escaped the fever. Among those who died were Constance, Thecla, Ruth, and Frances, the Rev. Charles Parsons, and the Rev. Louis Schuyler. All six are buried at Elmwood Cemetery.

The monument marking the joint grave of Parsons and Schuyler bears the inscription: "Greater Love Hath No Man." The high altar in St. Mary's Cathedral, Memphis, is a memorial to the four Sisters.

Prayer:

We give you thanks and praise, O God of compassion, for the heroic witness of Constance and her companions, who, in a time of plague and pestilence, were steadfast in their care for the sick and the dying, and loved not their own lives, even unto death. Inspire in us a like love and commitment to those in need, following the example of our Savior Jesus Christ; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Note: St. Mary's Episcopal School is still a growing and dynamic place, educating young women in Memphis and providing them a strong academic and spiritual experience. My daughter Beverly is their newly hired Director of College Guidance.
