## Rector's Writ

It seems as soon as Halloween is over, preparation for the holiday season goes into a frantic full swing. We start thinking about how many people we'll have under one roof and around the table for Thanksgiving. We begin to hear Christmas carols the very next day. Catalogues that arrived in August are now followed by 'last minute specials' that begin before we can even light the first Advent candle. The annual stewardship drive at Church is properly focused on thanks and gratitude. We have to take care that our good intentions of prayer, gratitude and thanksgiving to God don't get lost in the ongoing blitz of shopping, preparation, and partying.

That theme of stewardship being a year round effort all too easily gets pushed quietly to the back burner. We wholeheartedly agree with the Thanksgiving and stewardship reminders that ALL we have comes from God. Yet too often we forget too quickly about gratitude, joy, giving thanks to God, and giving back to God.

It's no accident that our weekly Eucharist includes both a prayer of confession and a prayer of thanksgiving. It's a lovely balance reminding us how faith calls us to respond to God's goodness. We need to receive forgiveness and offer our thanks; to receive strength and offer our faithfulness; to receive grace and offer our gratitude. We learn to humbly accept these gifts from the Lord who delights in giving them. Surely the Lord doesn't need our thanks, so much as we need to BE thankful, joyful, willing to serve, willing to give and share from ALL that we've been given. May our holiday preparation include an ongoing sense of gratitude and a generous response to the goodness, grace, and blessings God so abundantly provides us all.

*For all your bounty, gracious Lord, we praise and thank you. You are ever giving with a full hand gifts to your people. May we show our gratitude in lives of service for you and for each other; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

*Receive, O Lord, our thanks for the blessings you continually bestow upon us. We offer to you the gifts you have given to us; and we pray that they may be used to carry out your gracious will, with joy and thanksgiving, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*





Hiram Farm Living and Learning Community is a nonprofit organization that provides opportunities for people with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) to grow, learn, work, and live in a setting focused on respect and support for individuals and the environment.

They have a wish list of articles they would like to be donated - - it is very long, but many of the items are ones that have been donated to the Sit & Stitch from time to time. Here is that list.

Floating row covers, Scissors to cut fabric, for rag rugs and to harvest greens and sprouts, fabric (sheets, old shirts, quilting scraps) for rag rugs, plastic bags and 1-gallon Ziploc bags for packing veggies for customers, hat cable to keep seedlings warm, industrial fans for circulating air in the hoop houses, small livestock trailer, cable spools, woven wire fencing for sheet, T-spots, Portable electric fencing, Cordless drill, cordless circular saw, cordless sawzall, Tarps (any size), Lumber, Hand saw, Bow saw, Riding mover with bag, push mover or gas powered mower (walk behind), Tilling attachment for tractor, wood lathe, router, thickness planer, jointer, drill press, bench grinder, woodwork chisels, exhaust fan, crosscut handsaw, rip saw, bench vices, surge protectors, shop towels, face masks with vents, extension cords, drop lights, and flashlights

THE FARM HOUSE NEEDS ARE: refrigerator, rocking chairs, patio/picnic furniture, cleaning and painting supplies, artificial Christmas trees, trash cans, microwave oven, office furniture, small kitchen table with chairs.

# *Fathers (and Mothers) and Friends*

*They lived not only in ages past; there are hundreds of thousands still.  
The world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.*

William Temple

November 6

William Temple was born October 15, 1881, the second son of Frederick Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury. He suffered from gout from the age of 2 and from a cataract that left him blind in his right eye by the age of 40. However, he was an avid reader with a nearly photographic memory. He loved music and literature. He was educated at Balliol College of Oxford University where he earned double firsts in classics. In addition, he was president of the Oxford Union, the debate society. It was here that his ability to synthesize arguments, summing up the pros and cons so clearly that opponents often ended up agreeing with each other, became recognized.

In 1906, he applied for ordination; however, the Bishop of Oxford refused because Temple admitted that he wasn't sure he believed fully in the Virgin Birth and the Bodily Resurrection of Christ. The Archbishop of Canterbury (his father's successor) decided that Temple's thought was developing in a direction that would lead to belief and ordained him deacon in 1909 and priest in 1910. He served as headmaster of the prep school he had attended until 1914 when he returned to full-time clergy status. He was elected Bishop of Manchester in 1921. This city was heavily industrial and during the General Strike of 1926, when workers struck not against particular employers but against the social and economic policies of the country as a whole, Temple worked extensively to mediate between the parties. The settlement he helped craft was considered fair by both sides. He became known as a defender of the working class movement who supported economic and social reforms. In 1929 he became Archbishop of York and in 1942 Archbishop of Canterbury. By this point, he was considered one of the most significant Anglican churchmen of the twentieth century because of his writing (especially *Christianity and Social Order* which spelled out an Anglican social theology and a vision for what should constitute a just post-war society), his evangelism, his support of social reforms, and his leadership of the ecumenical movement.

It was during his 2 years as Archbishop of Canterbury that Temple became most politically active on the international stage. His influence led to the formation of the British Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches. Working jointly with the Chief Rabbi in England, he co-founded the Council of Christians and Jews to combat anti-Semitism and other forms of prejudice in Britain. In March of 1943 in an address to the House of Lords, he urged that action be taken on the atrocities being carried out by Nazi Germany. In addition, he publicly supported a negotiated peace, rather than the unconditional surrender the Allies were demanding, thinking that this would shorten the war and reduce the number of atrocities. In 1944, he made a visit to Normandy during Operation Overlord (invasion of Normandy), making him the first Archbishop of Canterbury to go into battle since the Middle Ages. During the fall of that year his gout, which had always been troublesome, became serious. In mid-October, he arrived at a clergy retreat by ambulance and spoke standing on his good foot. He died days later on October 26, 1944, and was buried in the south wall of the Corona of Canterbury Cathedral.

Prayer: O God of light and love, you illumined your Church through the witness of your servant William Temple: Inspire us, we pray, by his teaching and example that we may rejoice with courage, confidence and father in the Word made flesh, and may be led to establish that city which has justice for its foundation and love for its law; through Jesus Christ, the light of the world, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.
